FEDERAL FUNDS

The U. S. Department of Health & Human Services/Office of Inspector General has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit. The Unit was established to investigate and prosecute fraud committed by providers of medical services to Medicaid recipients. The Unit also investigates reports of abuse/neglect/exploitation of adult residents/patients in Mississippi health care facilities. The Medicaid Fraud grant award requires a 25% match.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded a continuation grant to the Attorney General's Cyber Crime Division to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The ICAC Task Force is the umbrella agency for the State of Mississippi for enforcement, investigation, and prosecution of Internet Crimes Against Children. The Task Force is the central training facility for ICAC investigative standards, forensic analysis, and prosecution and provides on-site and in-the-field technical assistance for agencies involved in ICAC cases. The Task Force provides leadership for proactive and reactive investigations and extends outreach into law enforcement, the community, and educational system for prevention and intervention of internet or technological exploitation of children.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded grant funds to the Attorney General's Prosecutor Training Division to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans. One hundred percent of this funding will be awarded to prosecutors and public defenders who qualify for loan assistance.

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Tobacco and Alcohol Enforcement Division for the purpose of carrying out inspections of entities and retail establishments that sell or advertise cigarettes and/or smokeless tobacco products to determine whether those entities are complying with the Tobacco Control Act. FDA has been granted authority to regulate the manufacture, marketing, and distribution of tobacco products to protect the public health generally and to reduce tobacco use by minors. The award will enable the Attorney General's Office to assist FDA in any enforcement or judicial actions, including coordinating the drafting and execution of declarations by the officers and minors who participated in inspections, and arranging for their testimony, if necessary, and furnishing evidence.

Federal sub-grant funds were received from the Department of Public Safety to improve the quality of DUI prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate for those offenses. The impaired driver is the primary contributing factor in fatal traffic crashes every year. Although speeding and other aggressive driving behaviors cause deadly crashes too, alcohol remains the predominant enemy of traffic safety. When DUI arrests decrease, there are corresponding increases in traffic fatalities. The Public Safety DUI grant requires a 20% match.

The Mississippi State Department of Health has awarded funding through OVW Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) STOP Program to the Attorney General's Domestic Violence Division. The Mississippi State Department of Health sub-grant is a VAWA grant which is used to develop and provide educational courses for law enforcement, court clerks, prosecutors, judges, and advocates on the topics of domestic violence, sex crimes, stalking, strangulation, and human trafficking. Other duties include assisting local prosecutors in the prosecution of cases as needed and serving as a resource for law enforcement, judges and other court personnel when questions arise. This Mississippi State Department of Health VAWA grant requires a 25% match.

The Mississippi State Department of Health has awarded funding through the OVC Victims of Crime Act Victim Assistance Program to the Attorney General's Crime Victim Compensation Division. The Mississippi State Department of Health subgrant is a VOCA Victim Assistance grant which is used to provide advocacy and support for victims of all crime types. The Mississippi State Department of Health Victim Assistance grant requires a 20% match.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the OIG/CDI in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of disability laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with U.S. Customs in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of immigration laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the U.S. Marshals Service in a collaborative effort to provide services in the apprehension of fugitives.

OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

Since "fees, assessments and other revenues charged" have been eliminated by SB 2362/SB 2001, the Attorney General Special Funds consist of monies which may be limited or restricted by federal or State law, by court order, by grant conditions or other limitations. These sources include monies such as consumer penalties designated for consumer fraud education and investigative and enforcement operations, medicaid fraud penalties, court ordered settlements and restitution, MSDH Tobacco Funding, seized and forfeited funds designated for consumer protection or human trafficking activities, county payments for Regional Section 2036 Choctaw Compliance Coordinator, Annie E. Casey Foundation funds designated for the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI), indirect costs recovered on federal grants, MS EdNet funding, patent filing reimbursements, and the Janet D. Steiger funds designated as a fellowship for law student internships.

TREASURY FUND / BANK

Attorney General's Office Imprest Fund, Community Bank, #100-5009939, is the agency's petty cash account used for general authorized expenditures.

Attorney General's Office Investigation Fund, Community Bank, #100-5009921, is an imprest fund utilized for costs (often confidential in nature) related to Drug Investigations, White-Collar Crime, Cyber Crime, Consumer and Medicaid Fraud cases.

The Attorney General Sponsorship Fund, Trustmark Bank, #100-899-2520, is used for programs and events that support state law enforcement officers.

Attorney General's Cafeteria Plan Checking, Bancorpsouth, #60758265, is established in order to pay reimbursements to employees participating in the Cafeteria Plan. Funds are deposited into the account each month from employee payroll deductions. Documentation is submitted to the plan administrator and checks are processed by the plan administrator. This office receives the checks from the plan administrator and distributes them to appropriate employees.

The Attorney General Contingent Fund, Trustmark Bank, #100-091-9621, is used for the purpose of holding and distributing monies, expenses, and fees from judgments, settlements, restitution, and penalties, etc.

Name of Agency

I. Program Description:

The Supportive Services Program provides administrative and technical support in the areas of management (planning, organizing and staffing), finance, personnel, accounting, budgeting, grant management and reporting, information systems, purchasing, payroll, internal auditing, maintenance of law library, management of all legal contracts, and administration of the Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund. The Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund was created in Section 45-2-21, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide supplemental compensation not covered by worker's compensation in the form of disability benefits to any actively employed law enforcement officer or volunteer fire fighter or reserve/auxiliary law enforcement officer or volunteer fire fighter who is accidentally or intentionally injured in the line of duty as a direct result of a single incident. The statute mandates that a set amount of fees collected for certain violations, misdemeanors, and felonies be deposited to the Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust fund and administered by the Attorney General. However, Senate Bill 2362 passed during the 2016 Regular Session of the Legislature redirected these fees into the General Fund requiring a direct appropriation.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Supportive Services Program is to provide the necessary administrative support for the Office of the Attorney General to perform its mandated functions as the Chief Legal Officer of the State of Mississippi. The goal of Supportive Services is to provide the necessary support as cost efficiently, timely, and equitably as possible.

Attorney General 2 - Training

Name of Agency Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Training Program is charged with the responsibility of providing training for Mississippi Prosecutors. The Program was statutorily created, Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide Continuing Legal Education and technical assistance to state, county, and municipal prosecutors. Further, as statutorily dictated in Section 43-21-117, all youth court prosecutors and county prosecuting attorneys who serve as youth court prosecutors shall be required to receive juvenile justice training approved by the Mississippi Attorney General's Office and regular annual continuing education in the field of juvenile justice. The statute mandates that a set amount of fees collected for certain violations, misdemeanors, and felonies be deposited to the State Prosecutor Education Fund and administered by the Attorney General. However, Senate Bill 2362 passed during the 2016 Regular Session of the Legislature redirected these fees into the General Fund requiring a direct appropriation.

The Program also provides technical assistance for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys as provided by Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972) by training investigators, victim assistance coordinators, worthless check unit personnel, and others who provide technical support for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys. The Program serves as a tool for liaison for the prosecutors and the Mississippi Legislature, as well as various State, Federal, and local criminal justice agencies and groups.

II. Program Objective:

The primary objective of the Training Program is to enhance criminal justice services to the citizens of the State of Mississippi by providing critical, applicable, and timely continuing legal education for State, county, and municipal prosecuting attorneys.

III. Current program activities as supported by the funding in Columns 6-15 (FY 2020 & FY 2021Increase/Decrease for continuations) of MBR-1-03 and designated Budget Unit Decisions columns of MBR-1-03-A:

(D) Cost Continuation:

Cost Continuation funding is requested to ensure the enhancement of criminal justice services to the citizens of the State of Mississippi by providing critical, applicable, and timely continuing legal education for State, county, and municipal prosecuting attorneys and training for law enforcement.

\$9,170 is being requested in general funds to replace the portion of salaries being paid out of limited special funds in FY 2020.

State Prosecutor Education - Provides training programs to enhance criminal justice services to citizens of the State of Mississippi by providing critical, applicable, and timely continuing legal education for State, county and municipal prosecuting attorneys.

Motorcycle Officer Training Program [Section 45-6-21, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] - Provides training programs that are administered and approved by the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Association. The funding is used to provide training to state and local law enforcement officers, including, but not limited to, motorcycle officers training.

Without this funding, prosecutors and law enforcement officers will not receive the level of education and training necessary to assist them in the performance of their duties.

Attorney General 3 - Litigation

Name of Agency

Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General as stated in Section 7-5-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), "...shall be the chief legal officer and advisor for the state, both civil and criminal, and is charged with managing all litigation on behalf of the state...."

Civil litigation provides trial and appellate legal representation to the State, State agencies and boards, and State officials and employees sued in their official and individual capacities. Civil actions are as varied as discrimination, personal injury, voting rights, contracts, Section 1983 prisoner litigation, civil rights, and administrative appeals in all state and federal courts.

Criminal litigation represents the State in all direct criminal appeals, post-conviction review, federal habeas corpus, and other criminal proceedings in the Supreme Court of Mississippi, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, the United States District Courts for Mississippi and on certiorari to the Supreme Court of the United States. In Mississippi, the convicted defendant in a criminal case has an automatic statutory right of appeal to the Mississippi Supreme Court from a circuit court judgment. A brief is filed on each of these appeals by the Criminal Litigation Division of the Attorney General's Office on behalf of the State. Oral arguments are held at the request of the Court. (See Miss. Code Ann. 1972, Section 99-35-1.) State appeals are limited by statute and in practice are handled by the District Attorneys. Death penalty appeals are handled by a sub-division of the Criminal Litigation Division handling the direct appeals, state post-conviction review, and all federal habeas corpus litigation. All extraditions matters are also handled by this division. The Habeas Division represents the respondents in all non-death penalty federal habeas corpus cases pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §2254 and 28 U.S.C. §2241 in the United States District Courts for Mississippi and other districts as ordered, as well as the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals and on certiorari to the United States Supreme Court.

The Litigation Program does not solicit its cases and has little control regarding the number of cases which staff must handle.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Litigation Program is to manage all litigation on behalf of the State in a timely and professional manner and to maintain a docket of such cases.

Interlocal Agreements must be reviewed within the statutory time limit. Litigation support and expertise in various important areas of the law must be provided in a timely and effective manner.

Name of Agency Program Name

I. Program Description:

In accordance with Section 7-5-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and case law explaining the constitutional powers of the Attorney General of Mississippi under Section 173 of the Mississippi Constitution, the Office of the Attorney General is responsible for representing the State, its officials, and the state agencies carrying out the powers of the executive branch of government. The primary responsibility for the State Agency Contracts Program is for each attorney assigned to the Program to handle the day-to-day legal representation of state agencies. Prior to FY 2017 the Legislature had required the Attorney General to charge legal service fees to the various state agencies the Office represents. To accomplish this task, the Attorney General's Office had developed two (2) types of contracts from which state agencies could choose to pay for legal services. The first was a contract which charged a flat rate of \$65.00 per hour. This rate, while inadequate to cover actual costs incurred, had not been increased due to the State's budgetary constraints in an effort not to overburden financially stressed state agencies. The second was a contract in which the agency paid for a specific attorney for full-time representation. Agencies needing a large amount of legal assistance were better served by the contract for a full-time attorney position while most small agencies chose the hourly service contract. However, due to the passage of Senate Bill 2362 during the 2016 Regular Session of the Legislature, "no state agency shall charge another state agency a fee, assessment, rent or other charge for services or resources received..." As a general fund agency the Office of the Attorney General is to provide these services without compensation.

The Attorney General's Office has established a time keeping system for each attorney to record their time spent working for a specific agency. A detailed report and summary report of the attorney daily timesheets are sent to the agency for review and approval with the invoice for services.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the State Agency Contracts Program is for the Attorney General and his assistants to render such services deemed necessary to assist in advising and in representing the State and its entities as appropriate. The State Agency Contracts Program ensures an agency that specialization is provided and continuity of services is maintained.

Name of Agency Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Insurance Integrity Enforcement Bureau was created during the 1998 Regular Session of the Legislature in House Bill 428. As stated in Section 7-5-301, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), of the enabling legislation, "The duty of the bureau is to investigate and prosecute claims of insurance abuses and crimes involving insurance." Fifty percent (50%) of the Bureau's funding was received from the Workers' Compensation Commission's Administrative Expense Fund and was to be used primarily for the investigation and prosecution of workers' compensation fraud. The remaining fifty percent (50%) was funded through the State General Fund and was to be used primarily for the investigation and prosecution of insurance fraud other than workers' compensation fraud. However, due to the passage of Senate Bill 2362 during the 2016 Regular Session of the Legislature, Insurance Integrity Enforcement is now funded with 100% general funds.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Insurance Integrity Enforcement Bureau is to investigate and prosecute claims of insurance abuses and crimes involving insurance.

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs consists of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Public Integrity Division, the Consumer Protection Division, the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, and the Bureau of Victim Assistance comprised of the Domestic Violence Division and the Youth Services Division. These programs are fully comprehensive law enforcement units staffed by criminal investigators, auditors, and prosecuting attorneys who serve in combating the corrupt, deceptive, and illegal practices of unscrupulous medical providers, public officials, drug traffickers, and business enterprises.

The Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, established by Section 43-13-219, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), is responsible for the statewide investigation and prosecution of fraud committed by Medicaid providers. This Unit is also responsible for the investigation of abuse, neglect, and financial exploitation perpetrated upon vulnerable persons who are residents or patients in health care facilities. Funding for this program is received from a federal grant which reimburses 75% of the operating expenses. The Unit is re-certified annually by the Office of the Inspector General, Health and Human Services.

The Public Integrity Division is charged with the responsibility of conducting official investigations in accordance with Section 7-5-59, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), which details white collar crime and official corruption and assisting district attorneys and local law enforcement officials in the performance of their duties; and with the responsibility of impaneling a statewide grand jury to investigate and charge large-scale drug offenders in accordance with Section 13-7-1, et seq., Miss Code Ann. (1972). This Unit receives complaints and allegations from a variety of sources: state and local officials who have discovered such conduct in the performance of their routine responsibilities; calls and letters from citizens throughout the State who have observed actions that are believed to be improper; and referral of cases from local law enforcement officials and prosecutors which could better be handled by this Unit. The Public Integrity Division is comprised of both attorneys and investigators who work closely together to ensure that cases are efficiently prosecuted and also work with the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and other state and local law enforcement entities in identifying and dismantling large drug organizations through both criminal prosecution and civil forfeiture actions. The Public Integrity Division serves as the enforcement arm of the Mississippi Charitable Solicitations Act which requires charities to properly register with the Secretary of State's Office. The Vulnerable Persons Investigative Unit, Child Support Prosecution Unit, and DUI Unit are also a part of the Public Integrity Division. The Vulnerable Persons Unit was created as a part of the Vulnerable Persons Act [Section 43-47-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] to prosecute those accused of crimes against vulnerable persons and provide training to law enforcement, judges, district attorneys, state agencies and investigators at the Department of Human Services. The unit receives complaints from the Department of Human Services and other law enforcement agencies as well as complaints from other concerned individuals. [Section 43-47-5, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] The Child Support Prosecution Unit investigates and criminally prosecutes deadbeat parents for failure to pay court ordered child support in compliance with Sections 43-19-61 and 97-5-3, Miss. Code Ann. (1972). The DUI Unit funded by a federal sub-grant received from the Department of Public Safety provides a Traffic Safety Resources Prosecutor serving as a prosecutor, resource, and a liaison, while also providing technical legal assistance and training to prosecutors, law enforcement officers, court clerks, and judges.

The Cybercrime Division investigates and prosecutes high technology crimes in compliance with Section 7-5-59, Miss. Code Ann. (1972) to provide a safe electronic environment in Mississippi for the communication of information, ideas and commercial transactions and to protect children from online predators. The Division also provides technical assistance to state, local, and federal law enforcement officials in the investigation of electronic crimes as well as the seizure of computers and other digital evidence. The Attorney General's Cybercrime Division receives federal funds to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The ICAC Task Force is the umbrella agency for the State of Mississippi for enforcement, investigation, and prosecution of Internet Crimes Against Children. The Task Force is the central training facility for ICAC investigative standards, forensic analysis, and prosecution and provides on-site and in-the-field technical assistance for agencies involved in ICAC cases. The Task Force provides leadership for proactive and reactive investigations and extends outreach into law enforcement, the community, and educational system for prevention and intervention of internet or technological exploitation of children.

The Consumer Protection Division was created in 1974 by Section 75-24-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), as amended. The Consumer Protection Act of 1994 amended and strengthened this Section. Consumer Protection handles a wide range of complaints from citizens located throughout the State of Mississippi. These complaints include, but are not limited to, lottery and sweepstakes scams, new and used car sales, and telemarketing fraud. Consumer Protection fields thousands of calls and emails each year. The Division is also charged with the investigation and prosecution of identity theft, home

repair fraud, and intellectual property crimes, as well as the issuance of Identity Theft Passports [Section 97-45-29, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)]. The Division promotes consumer education through participation in civic group functions, student lectures, law enforcement seminars, and other types of presentations throughout the State, as well as publishes and distributes public education brochures. Mediation of business complaints and investigation of deceptive business practices constitute a large part of the Division's activities. To carry out its mission, Consumer Protection is also authorized to exercise various types of enforcement activities, including subpoenas, cease and desist orders, assurances of voluntary compliance, injunctions, criminal prosecutions, and collection of civil penalties.

The Bureau of Victim Assistance, Domestic Violence Division [Section 93-21-31, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)], provides training for law enforcement, judges, private attorneys, prosecutors, court personnel, advocates, social workers, students and medical personnel in the areas of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, strangulation sexual assault, domestic abuse protection orders, report writing and courtroom testimony, opioids, and related matters including human trafficking, victims' rights, opioids as well as officer-involved shootings and de-escalation tactics for special populations. The Domestic Violence Division works with other divisions within the Attorney General's Office to accomplish training goals. The Division produces educational and training guides to support its efforts. The Division staff assists local prosecutors when requested in the prosecution of domestic violence offenders, and also works in conjunction with other public entities and non-profit organizations for the promotion of domestic violence prevention. The Division also administers the Mississippi Protection Order Registry [Section 93-21-25, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] and trains court clerks, dispatch and law enforcement on usage of the Registry and the Mississippi Uniform Offense Report. By serving as a resource to all those who come into contact with domestic violence, strangulation, stalking, sexual assault and human trafficking victims, the Division brings the full weight of the State of Mississippi to combat these crimes, and to achieve the joint goals of holding offenders accountable and ensuring that our victims remain safe from further violence. The Division also provides training to law enforcement officers regarding officer-involved shootings and has developed the "Safe with Dignity: Crisis Intervention through De-escalation for Police Encounters with the Mentally Ill and Special Needs Populations (SaDi CID)" Project. Training under this project began in August 2016. Additionally, the Division conducts the Encourage Sexual Assault ARREST Project providing training to law enforcement officers on the investigation and prosecution of sex crimes. The Encourage Sexual Assault ARREST Project continues the "Rape Kit Testing Initiative" which seeks to have all rape kits collected sent to the lab for testing and all results entered into CODIS, the FBI's database, regardless of whether there is a prosecution of the crime. The Division is responsible for issues and projects dealing with human trafficking and plays a key role in training and legislation development; and, is working closely with government and non-government entities to develop a statewide plan for addressing human trafficking. The Division is also working with other government and non-governmental entities to address the opioid and heroin crisis in Mississippi. Finally, during FY2019, the Division took the lead in developing a mental health task force which brings together more than 50 government and non-government agencies and organizations to address ways to improve the state's mental health system and effectively address the mental health crisis in Mississippi. Other projects in the early stages of development by the Division include initiatives (1) to address e-cigarette/vaping/juuling by youth, (2) to improve internet safety, screening and monitoring of school-issued computers, (3) to create child-friendly apps for the topics of depression, bullying, and suicide. The Youth Services Division collaborates with other state agencies and nonprofit organizations to work to improve the juvenile justice and child welfare systems to facilitate efforts to reduce juvenile delinquency, truancy, drop-out rates, cyberbullying, exploitation of children, child abuse, and child neglect through training and technical assistance.

The Alcohol & Tobacco Enforcement Division ensures compliance with state laws that prohibit the sale of tobacco products and alcohol to minors. The FDA Unit which is also a part of the Alcohol & Tobacco Enforcement Division is funded through the Food and Drug Administration and ensures compliance with federal laws that prohibit the sale of tobacco to minors.

II. Program Objective:

The overall objective of the Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs is to investigate and prosecute all illegal activities relating to Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation, drug trafficking, misconduct of public officials and business enterprises, identity theft, cyber crime, child support, and tobacco and alcohol sale to minors. In addition, assistance is provided to United States Attorneys, district attorneys, and federal and local law enforcement agencies in the performance of their duties. Other Mandated Programs addresses juvenile prevention, intervention, and juvenile justice alternatives. The Program is also involved in the war on drugs by utilizing the State's asset forfeiture statutes and providing prosecutors and law enforcement officers with pre-arrest asset investigative assessments and post-arrest legal, prosecutorial assistance, and training in DUI investigation and prosecution.

Cost Continuation funding is requested to ensure that we retain adequate staff to investigate and prosecute all illegal activities relating to Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation; drug and human trafficking, internet crimes and crimes against children, child support, tobacco and alcohol sale to minors, identity theft, counterfeit goods, misconduct of public officials and business enterprises and provide assistance to United States Attorneys, district attorneys, and federal and local law enforcement agencies in the performance of their duties.

\$224,102 is being requested in general funds to replace the portion of salaries being paid out of limited special funds in FY 2020.

Cybercrime and Internet Crimes Against Children - Investigates and prosecutes crimes involving the receipt, production and possession of child pornography and computer luring; Initiates proactive investigations to protect children from the dangers of those who would use the internet to harm them; Investigates and prosecutes high technology crimes including exploitation of children, cyberstalking, cyberbullying, online enticement, denial of service, Ransomware, fraudulent commercial transactions, identity theft scams, credit card number theft, and other fraudulent internet schemes; Performs forensic examinations on computers, tablets, cellular devices, and other external media and optical disks.

Vulnerable Persons Investigation and Prosecution - Investigates and prosecutes crimes of abuse, neglect or exploitation committed against vulnerable persons where a vulnerable person is defined as a person who is unable to take care of the activities of daily living or is unable to provide for his or her own protection due to a mental, emotional, or physical developmental disability or dysfunction, or brain damage or the infirmities of aging; Assists in the training of law enforcement officers, judges, district attorneys, state agencies and investigators with the Department of Human Services with regard to issues arising under the Vulnerable Persons Act.

Child Support Prosecution - Investigates and prosecutes cases against individuals who willfully, unlawfully, feloniously and knowingly refuse to provide for the support and maintenance of their natural children in direct violation and contradiction of state law.

Children's Advocacy Centers - Administers support to the Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi for the purpose of training forensic interviewers in child abuse and child sexual abuse cases, training law enforcement officers and prosecutors about child abuse cases, and expanding the number of Children's Advocacy Centers to underserved areas.

Domestic Violence - Provides training for law enforcement officers on state laws pertaining to appropriate law enforcement response to the crimes of domestic violence, stalking, sexual assault, and protection order violations.

This funding is critical to ensure that these programs remain solvent for the continued protection of our most vulnerable citizens.

I. Program Description:

The Crime Victims Compensation Division provides financial assistance and support services to victims of violent crime and their family members as mandated in the MS Crime Victims Compensation Act [Section 99-41-1 et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)]. Compensation is awarded for medical care, rehabilitation, counseling services for the victim and the victim's family member(s), funeral expenses, loss of wages, loss of tuition, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, execution travel, domestic violence temporary housing assistance, domestic violence relocation assistance, and repair/replacement. The overall maximum allowable for awards payable is twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), with limits applied to each benefit type. Also, the Crime Victim Compensation Division reimburses medical providers authorized payments for costs of sexual assault medical forensic examinations. Additionally, the Crime Victim Compensation Division provides ongoing training to victim service providers, law enforcement agencies, medical and mental health providers and others across the state who provide information, support and care to victims. The Victim Assistance Program was established with a federal grant in FY 2000 to provide enhanced direct services to crime victims. The program serves as a single point of contact for crime victims and the public-at-large in the State of Mississippi providing information, referral, advocacy and support to persons who contact the program.

The Address Confidentiality Program (ACP), mandated by Section 99-47-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), became effective July 1, 2009. Persons enrolled in the ACP may request that state/local government agencies use a substitute address designated by the Attorney General's Office. The ACP can help a relocated victim of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking in their attempt to keep their new address confidential.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Crime Victims Compensation Division is to relieve the hardships of crime victims and assist in their recovery whenever possible by providing compensation, direct services, advocacy, and public awareness and education to victims, their family members, law enforcement, court officials, and the public-at-large.

III. Current program activities as supported by the funding in Columns 6-15 (FY 2020 & FY 2021Increase/Decrease for continuations) of MBR-1-03 and designated Budget Unit Decisions columns of MBR-1-03-A:

(B) Escalations:

Escalate one (1) Branch Director II position and associated costs. This position and costs are escalated for the Federally Funded Department of Health Victim Assistance Award to fully staff the program in compliance with the federal grant awards.

Cost Continuation funding is requested to ensure adequate staff to relieve the hardships of crime victims and assist in their recovery whenever possible by providing compensation, direct services, advocacy, and public awareness and education to victims, their family members, law enforcement, court officials, and the public-at-large.

The Fiscal Year 2021 Budget Request for the Attorney General's Office includes the appropriation for eight (8) programs - Supportive Services, Training, Opinions, Litigation, State Agency Contracts, Insurance Integrity Enforcement, Other Mandated Programs, and Crime Victims Compensation. These programs represent the combined budget of the State's largest law office. By mandate of Article 6, Section 173, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, there shall be an Office of Attorney General. This office is entrusted with management of all legal affairs of the State and prosecution of all suits, civil or criminal, in which the State has an interest. The Attorney General has the power to control and manage all litigation on behalf of the state and to maintain all suits necessary for enforcement of State laws, preservation of order, and protection of public rights.

The passage of the "Mississippi Budget Transparency and Simplification Act of 2016" during the 2016 Regular Session [SB 2362] and SB 2001 during the 2017 First Extraordinary Session resulted in a material redesign of the funding structure of this office. Accordingly, our FY 2021 Budget Request is a representation of this major funding shift from multiple funding sources in FY 2016 to general and federal funding sources with limited special funds in FY 2021. In an effort to continue the responsibilities and services mandated in statute, the Office of the Attorney General is requesting a total of \$35,513,883 for FY 2021 of which \$26,402,397 is general funds. The additional \$2,772,643 of general funds above that appropriated in FY 2020 is requested to provide the office with the funding necessary to cover the salaries of employees from every program with general funds rather than depend on special funds to supplement (\$1,006,681); to continue the implementation and maintenance of the new case management systems (\$746,000); and to continue the Crime Victim Compensation Program (\$1,019,962). These requests, as well as some of the overall funding changes, are described in more detail in the paragraphs below.

With the loss of special funds this office must rely on general funds to cover salaries previously funded through the fee assessments resulting in the need for an additional \$1,006,681 of general funds to replace special funds to be expended in FY 2020 on salaries.

The Attorney General's Office and District Attorneys are currently working with ITS on an RFP to replace the current 14 year old obsolete case management system utilized to meet the statutory requirement of maintaining case dockets. The District Attorneys' offices (Program 2. Training) will implement the new case management system utilizing special funds in one (1) pilot office and four (4) additional offices in FY 2020. The remaining 15 districts will be migrated over in FY 2021. As a result of the implementation of this pilot project in FY 2020, \$305,000 is being reduced from special funds for FY 2021. \$371,000 is being requested in general funds to complete the District Attorney Case Management System for the remaining districts in FY 2021.

The Attorney General's Office will implement the new case management system in FY 2021. \$275,000 is being requested in general funds to complete the implementation of the new system. The cost has been allocated to all eight (8) programs.

The new Domestic Violence Uniform Reporting System and the Protective Order Registry (Program 7. Other Mandated Programs) will be implemented in FY 2020 using special funds at a cost of \$1,200,000. As a result of the implementation of this project in FY 2020, \$1,200,000 is being reduced from special funds for FY 2021. \$100,000 in general funds is being requested to cover the maintenance costs for both systems.

Due to the loss of assessment funding, the Crime Victims Compensation Fund must be funded through our general funds requiring the additional \$1,019,962 to provide financial assistance and services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, counseling services for victims and victims' family members, funeral expenses, loss of wages to the victim or claimant, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, domestic violence temporary assistance and domestic violence relocation assistance.

The Attorney General's Office received several grants during Fiscal Year 2019 which have carried forward into Fiscal Year 2020 and will carry forward into Fiscal Year 2021. These grants include a Department of Health and Human Services/Office of Inspector General (DHHS/OIG) Medicaid Fraud Control grant for the investigation and prosecution of fraud committed by medical providers and investigation and prosecution of cases involving abuse, neglect and exploitation of residents/patients in health care facilities; a Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs Grant to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force; a Department of Justice Grant to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans; a U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) contract to carry out inspections of entities and retail establishments that sell or advertise cigarettes and/or smokeless tobacco products to determine whether those entities are complying with the Tobacco Control Act; a Department of Public Safety Grant to improve the quality of DUI prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate for those offenses; a Mississippi State Department of Health Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) Grant to develop and provide educational courses for law enforcement, court clerks, prosecutors, judges, and advocates on the topics of domestic violence, sex crimes, stalking, strangulation, and human trafficking as well as assist local prosecutors in the prosecution of cases and serve as a resource for law

enforcement, judges, and other court personnel when questions arise; and a Mississippi State Department of Health Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Victim Assistance Grant which provides advocacy and support to victims. The Office received a non-federal grant from the Annie E. Casey Foundation and will continue to focus on a Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI) that will affect juvenile justice and youth who are at-risk of entering the juvenile justice system with the goal of reducing the number of youth being detained in secure detention facilities.

The Supportive Services Program provides administrative and technical support in the areas of management (planning, organizing and staffing), finance, personnel, accounting, budgeting, grant management and reporting, information systems, purchasing, payroll, internal auditing, maintenance of law library, management of all legal contracts, and administration of the Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund.

The Training Program is charged with the responsibility of providing training for Mississippi prosecutors. The Program was statutorily created, Section 37-26-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide Continuing Legal Education (CLE) and technical assistance to state, county, and municipal prosecutors. The statute mandates that a set amount of fees collected for certain violations, misdemeanors, and felonies be deposited to the State Prosecutor Education Fund and administered by the Attorney General. However, the passage of the "Mississippi Budget Transparency and Simplification Act of 2016 redirected the these fees into the General Fund requiring direct appropriation. The Motorcycle Officer Training Program provides training that is administered and approved by the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officers Association.

The Litigation Program is responsible for managing all litigation for the State. The Attorney General as stated in Section 7-5-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), "... shall be the chief legal officer and advisor for the state, both civil and criminal, and is charged with managing all litigation on behalf of the state ..."

The Opinions Program researches, prepares, and distributes formal written opinions in response to questions of law from all state and local entities, officials, and their attorneys. In accordance with Section 7-5-25, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), the Attorney General shall give his opinion, without fee, to any state or local public official.

The State Agency Contracts Program is responsible for handling the day-to-day legal representation of state agencies. In accordance with Section 7-5-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and case law explaining the constitutional powers of the Attorney General of Mississippi under Section 173 of the Mississippi Constitution, the Attorney General's Office is responsible for representing the State, its officials, and the state agencies carrying out the powers of the executive branch of government.

The Insurance Integrity Enforcement Bureau was created during the 1998 Regular Session of the Legislature in House Bill 428. As stated in Section 7-5-301, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), of the enabling legislation, "The duty of the bureau is to investigate and prosecute claims of insurance abuses and crimes involving insurance."

The Other Mandated Programs consists of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Public Integrity Division (inclusive of the DUI, Vulnerable Persons, and Child Support Prosecution Units), the Consumer Protection Division, the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, the Cybercrime Division, and the Bureau of Victim Assistance (inclusive of the Domestic Violence Division and Youth Services Division). The Majority of these programs are fully comprehensive law enforcement units staffed by criminal investigators, auditors, and prosecuting attorneys who serve in combating the corrupt, deceptive, and illegal practices of medical providers, public officials, drug traffickers, and business enterprises. The other programs ensure the collaboration with other state agencies and nonprofit organizations as to the safety and well-being of children, domestic violence and human trafficking training and initiatives, and other issues affecting children and youth.

The Crime Victims Compensation Division provides financial assistance and support services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, rehabilitation, counseling services for the victim and the victim's family member(s), funeral expenses, loss of wages for the victim or claimant and loss of support for dependents of deceased victims. This division is also responsible for administering the Address Confidentiality Program which provides a layer of protection for domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking victims fleeing their assailants. The Victim Assistance Program, established with a federal grant in FY 2000, serves as a single point of contact for crime victims and the public-at-large in the State of Mississippi and provides information, referral, advocacy and support to persons who contact the Office for victim assistance.

The Budget Request by major object for Fiscal Year 2021 is as follows:

The Attorney General's Office is requesting \$26,953,226 in salaries, wages and fringe benefits. Salaries comprise 75.89% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The largest portion of these funds ensures that competent attorneys with appropriate expertise represent the State of Mississippi in all actions from litigation to state agency representation. Critical support for these attorneys is provided by the legal secretarial staff. Such support is necessary in assisting the attorneys in meeting deadlines, filing appropriate documents in various courts, and maintaining case files and dockets.

The second largest portion of funds ensures the investigation of Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation, white collar crime, drug trafficking, vulnerable person abuse, Cybercrime, consumer fraud, insurance fraud, and illegal sale of tobacco products and alcohol to minors. These investigators perform field investigations, provide evidence for litigation, and testify in court as necessary.

A small portion of salaries provides for staffing Crime Prevention and Victim Services, Prosecutor Training, Domestic Violence, and Crime Victims Compensation. The remainder of salaries is dedicated to the administrative support staff which provides administrative and technical support to the Attorney General's Office.

Personal Services - Travel

This Office is requesting \$886,200 in this category. Travel costs comprise 2.50% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The in-state travel is used to pay for legal staff to represent the Office in matters relating to pending litigation, to attend court, investigative travel, annual meetings for CLE, conducting investigations of retail establishments that sell tobacco products and alcohol to minors and seminars held outside the Jackson area. The out-of-state travel request is for attending NAAG (National Association of Attorneys General) meetings held for various staff members, training required for Medicaid Fraud and Insurance Fraud Investigators, presenting arguments before the Fifth Circuit and U.S. Supreme Court, and providing CLE training to prosecutors sponsored by the National District Attorneys Association.

Contractual Services

\$3,769,435 is requested in the Contractual Services Category. Contractual costs comprise 10.61% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. Details of the request in this category are as follows:

A. Tuition, Rewards & Awards

\$82,600 is requested in this area for employee training and tuition at various conferences and seminars. This category also includes the payment of registration fees for conferences.

B. Communications, Transportation & Utilities

\$24,515 is requested in this area for postage, transportation of goods, and electricity. Freight is primarily associated with the delivery of various law books and for receiving and returning data processing equipment items to the manufacturer for repairs covered under warranty agreements.

D. Rents

\$176,055 is requested in this area to cover the cost for office space rented from Estes Rental Properties in Houston, Mississippi. Other costs include rental of office equipment, i.e., copiers and postage meters, etc.; rental of audiovisual equipment for training conferences; and rental of exhibits, displays and conference rooms. Per the SB 2362/SB 2001 legislation which prohibits agencies from charging another agency a fee, amounts previously paid to the Department of Finance and Administration for Capitol Facilities Building Rental have been eliminated from the request.

E. Repairs & Service

\$58,460 is requested in this area for repairs to the office passenger vehicles; and various repairs to items of office equipment and other equipment that are not covered under maintenance agreements. These items include typewriters, calculators, transcribers, fax machines and dictating machines.

F. Fees, Professional & Other Services

\$1,316,310 is requested in this area for fees paid to outside legal counsel; medical doctor fees and dental fees for expert witnesses; other medical fees for expert witnesses for Medicaid Fraud Control Unit and physicals for investigators; psychologists fees for evaluation prior to hiring of law enforcement personnel and for the Office's Employee Assistance Program; Personnel Services Contract fees for contractual workers such as law enforcement investigators, minors, and interns, associated travel, and travel of county and city prosecutors; court costs, filing fees, and court reporters; recording and notary fees; witness fees and expenses; laboratory and testing fees for evidence; temporary employment fees for legal secretaries; speaker fees for prosecutor training programs; contractual worker-FICA Match; and other fees and services including payments for services in complex litigation matters. Per the SB 2362/SB 2001 legislation which prohibits agencies from charging another agency a fee, amounts previously paid to the Department of Finance and Administration, State Personnel Board, State Auditor's Office and Public Safety have been eliminated from the request.

G. Other Contractual Services

\$236,005 is requested in this area for the annual tort claims assessment; insurance and faithful performance bonds on the Attorney General and staff; insurance on computer equipment; membership dues to the Mississippi Bar Association and other professional organizations; and VISA procurement card purchases.

H. Information Technology

\$1,839,790 is requested in this area for fees to outside vendors for the installation costs for IT and telecommunications hardware; IT training and education to allow IT employees and staff to attend courses on network maintenance, web design, database administration, and office suite software; software acquisition to include upgrades\maintenance for Microsoft SQL, Oracle, WordPerfect, Microsoft Office Suite, and completion of agency wide case management system, etc.; repair and maintenance charges for desktops, laser printers, plotters, laptops, file servers, network disk back-up units, scanners, firewall, and switches; and software maintenance for the agency wide Case Management System, Anti-Virus, Microsoft, VMWare, Document Management System, Bomgar Remote Assistance, Crime Victims Claim Assistant, Oracle, Domestic Violence Uniform Reporting System, and Protective Orders Registry. Senate Bill 2779 passed during the FY 2019 Regular Legislative Session, allows the Department of Information and Technology Services (ITS) to bill agencies for certain services. \$25,000 has been included in FY 2020 and FY 2021 under payments to the ITS to cover these new costs.

I. Other

\$35,700 is requested in this category for petty cash expense in relationship to drug buy money, investigation related expenses for the Public Integrity Division, Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, Consumer Protection Division, and Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, and prior year expense.

Commodities

We are requesting \$549,200 in this category. Commodity costs comprise 1.55% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. Below is a detailed request of this category:

B. Printing & Office Supplies & Materials

\$184,000 is requested in this category for printing letterhead, envelopes, budget and various documents; duplication and reproduction supplies (toner) for copiers and printers; office supplies and materials for entire Office; paper supplies for various printers, faxes, and copiers; law library books; and miscellaneous office equipment items valued at less than \$1,000.

C. Equipment Repair Parts, Supplies & Accessories

\$199,000 is requested for fuel, tires and tubes for automobiles and repair and replacement parts for vehicles.

E. Other Supplies & Materials

\$166,200 is requested for minor repairs; janitorial supplies; food for business meetings mainly for prosecutor training; uniforms

and wearing apparel for investigators; repair parts and accessories for non-major computer components, such as modems, scanners, memory upgrades, etc.; ammunition; other supplies and materials; other equipment less than \$1,000; small purchase of commodities on procurement card; reimbursement for travel commodities; and petty cash expenses.

Capital Outlay

2. Equipment

\$275,546 is requested in this area for replacement and purchase of office machines, furniture, fixtures, equipment and IS equipment. Equipment costs comprise 0.78% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. IS equipment to be purchased will be be three (3) forensic workstations, twenty-five (25) laptops, five (5) multifunction printers, one (1) ethernet switch, four (4) forensic computers, twenty (20) desktops, one (1) enhanced storage server, two (2) laser printers, one (1) DVD/USB drive duplicator, three (3) file servers, one (1) scanner, one (1) color laser printer, three (3) network switches, two (2) network storage hard drives, one (1) SAN storage, two (2) uninterrupted power source units, and two (2) projectors.

3. Vehicles

\$75,000 is requested for the replacement of three (3) high mileage undercover law enforcement vehicles. Vehicle costs comprise 0.21% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

4. Wireless Communication Devices

\$300 is requested for the replacement of one (1) wireless communication devices.

Subsidies, Loans & Grants

The \$3,004,976 requested for Subsidies, Loans and Grants comprises 8.46% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

The Victims Compensation Division will provide financial assistance and services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, counseling services for victims and victims' family members, funeral expenses, loss of wages to the victim or claimant, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, domestic violence temporary assistance and domestic violence relocation assistance.

The Support Services Division will provide disability benefits to law enforcement officers and fire fighters injured in the line of duty.

The Training Division will provide grants to individuals to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans. One hundred percent of this funding will be awarded to prosecutors and public defenders who qualify for loan assistance. The Training Division will also provide support to the Mississippi Law Enforcement Officer's Association for the implementation of approved law enforcement training programs.

The Domestic Violence Division will provide grants to the Mississippi Coalition Against Sexual Assault for the purpose of moving the State of Mississippi forward in its response to the crime of sexual assault as well as improving the quality and access of services to victims of sexual assault.

The Crime Prevention Division will provide support to the Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi. These Centers provide training to forensic interviewers in child abuse and child sexual abuse cases, and training for law enforcement officers and prosecutors about child abuse cases. The Crime Prevention Division will also provide support to entities for the implementation of the Annie E. Casey Foundation Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI).

Per the SB 2362/SB 2001 legislation which prohibits agencies from charging another agency a fee, amounts previously paid to the Mississippi Supreme Court for electronic court filings have been eliminated from the request.

This budget is funded from general funds, federal grant monies, and other limited special funds. In conclusion, as stated previously, the Attorney General's Office is requesting \$35,513,883 including escalated funds and positions for FY 2021. \$26,402,397 in general funds is being requested to ensure continuation of mandated programs and to cover Crime Victims Compensation and Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits payments which were previously funded by state monetary assessments. The sums requested are the result of careful planning and reflect those resources essential for the performance of the Attorney General's constitutional mandates. Program requests are interwoven to produce a well-integrated budget. Consequently, the ability of the Attorney General's Office to fully perform its duties requires a balanced, broad-based allocation of resources.
