FEDERAL FUNDS

The U. S. Department of Health & Human Services/Office of Inspector General has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit. The Unit was established to investigate and prosecute fraud committed by providers of medical services to Medicaid recipients. The Unit also investigates reports of abuse/neglect/exploitation of adult residents/patients in Mississippi health care facilities. The Medicaid Fraud grant award requires a 25% State match.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded a continuation grant to the Attorney General's Cyber Crime Division to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The ICAC Task Force is the umbrella agency for the State of Mississippi for enforcement, investigation, and prosecution of Internet Crimes Against Children. The Task Force is the central training facility for ICAC investigative standards, forensic analysis, and prosecution and provides on-site and in-the-field technical assistance for agencies involved in ICAC cases. The Task Force provides leadership for proactive and reactive investigations and extends outreach into law enforcement, the community, and educational system for prevention and intervention of internet or technological exploitation of children.

The U. S. Department of Justice awarded grant funds to the Attorney General's Prosecutor and Law Enforcement Training Division to assist public servants in the repayment of student loans. One hundred percent of this funding will be awarded to prosecutors and public defenders who qualify for loan assistance.

The U. S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has awarded funds to the Attorney General's Tobacco and Alcohol Enforcement Division for the purpose of carrying out inspections of entities and retail establishments that sell or advertise cigarettes and/or smokeless tobacco products to determine whether those entities are complying with the Tobacco Control Act. FDA has been granted authority to regulate the manufacture, marketing, and distribution of tobacco products to protect the public health generally and to reduce tobacco use by minors. The award will enable the Attorney General's Office to assist FDA in any enforcement or judicial actions, including coordinating the drafting and execution of declarations by the officers and minors who participated in inspections, and arranging for their testimony, if necessary, and furnishing evidence.

Federal sub-grant funds were received from the Department of Public Safety to improve the quality of DUI prosecutions, thus increasing the conviction rate for those offenses. The impaired driver is the primary contributing factor in fatal traffic crashes every year. Although speeding and other aggressive driving behaviors cause deadly crashes too, alcohol remains the predominant enemy of traffic safety. When DUI arrests decrease, there are corresponding increases in traffic fatalities. The Public Safety DUI grant requires a 20% State match.

The Mississippi State Department of Health has awarded funding through Office Against Interpersonal Violence to the Attorney General's Office. The Mississippi State Department of Health sub-grant is a Violence Against Women Act (VAWA-STOP) grant which is used to develop and provide educational courses for law enforcement, court clerks, prosecutors, judges, and advocates on the topics of domestic violence, sex crimes, stalking, strangulation, and human trafficking. Other duties include assisting local prosecutors in the prosecution of cases as needed and serving as a resource for law enforcement, judges, and other court personnel when questions arise. This Mississippi State Department of Health VAWA grant requires a 25% State match.

The Mississippi State Department of Health has awarded funding through the Office Against Interpersonal Violence to the Attorney General's Crime Victim Compensation Division. The Mississippi State Department of Health sub- grant is a VOCA Victim Assistance grant which is used to provide advocacy and support for victims of all crime types. The Mississippi State Department of Health Victim Assistance grant requires a 20% State match.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the OIG/CDI in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of disability laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the FBI in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of crimes against children laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the FDA in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of food and drug laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with U.S. Customs in a collaborative effort to provide services in the enforcement of immigration laws.

The Attorney General's Office has entered into an agreement with the U.S. Marshals Service in a collaborative effort to provide services in the apprehension of fugitives.

OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

The Attorney General Special Funds consist of monies, which may be limited or restricted by federal or State law, by court order, by grant conditions or other limitations. These sources include monies such as consumer penalties designated for consumer fraud education and investigative and enforcement operations, Medicaid fraud penalties, court ordered settlements and restitution, MSDH Tobacco Funding, seized and forfeited funds designated for consumer protection or human trafficking activities, indirect costs recovered on federal grants, MS EdNet funding, patent filing reimbursements, and the Janet D. Steiger funds designated as a fellowship for law student internships.

Pursuant to Section 2 of Senate Bill 3053 (2020 Session), the Governor transferred \$232,734 of federal CARES Act funds in the DFA CARES ACT COVID-19 Fund to the Attorney General's Office (AGO). This funding was used for equipment and technology necessary to enable the AGO to improve teleworking capabilities in order to comply with COVID-19 public health protocols.

TREASURY FUND / BANK

Attorney General's Office Imprest Fund, Community Bank, is the agency's petty cash account used for general authorized expenditures.

Attorney General's Office Investigation Fund, Community Bank, is an imprest fund utilized for costs (often confidential in nature) related to Drug Investigations, White-Collar Crime, Cyber Crime, Consumer and Medicaid Fraud cases.

The Attorney General Sponsorship Fund, Trustmark Bank, is used for programs and events that support state law enforcement officers.

Attorney General's Cafeteria Plan Checking, Bancorpsouth, is established in order to pay reimbursements to employees participating in the Cafeteria Plan. Funds are deposited into the account each month from employee payroll deductions. Documentation is submitted to the plan administrator and checks are processed by the plan administrator. This office receives the checks from the plan administrator and distributes them to appropriate employees.

The Attorney General Contingent Fund, Trustmark Bank, is used for the purpose of holding and distributing monies, expenses, and fees from judgments, settlements, restitution, and penalties, etc.

Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Supportive Services Program provides administrative and technical support in the areas of management (planning, organizing and staffing), finance, personnel, accounting, budgeting, grant management and reporting, information systems, purchasing, payroll, internal auditing, maintenance of law library, management of all legal contracts, and administration of the Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund. The Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund. The Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Disability Benefits Trust Fund. (1972), to provide supplemental compensation not covered by worker's compensation in the form of disability benefits to any actively employed law enforcement officer or volunteer fire fighter or reserve/auxiliary law enforcement officer or volunteer fire fighter who is accidentally or intentionally injured in the line of duty as a direct result of a single incident.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Supportive Services Program is to provide the necessary administrative support for the Office of the Attorney General to perform its mandated functions as the Chief Legal Officer of the State of Mississippi. The goal of Supportive Services is to provide the necessary support as cost efficiently, timely, and equitably as possible.

- IV. Additional program activities that will result from increased funding requested in Columns 16-25 (MBR-1-03) and specified Budget Decision Unit Columns (MBR-1-03-A):
- (D) Eliminate salary level cap of employees below Attorney General:

The AGO is requesting exemption from 25-3-39, which excludes employees from being paid a salary in excess of the executive head, for certain positions. Based on a multi-state salary survey, the salaries of attorneys and key executive employees are grossly underpaid when compared to the four contiguous states as well as the private sector. AGO is coordinating with the National Association of Attorney Generals and other states to perform a review of the agency including the organizational structure. AGO will work to implement several of these changes to streamline processes. The requested increase would help move closer to what other state's AG offices have as well as compare to other state agencies across the state. There are 2 PINs that would be considered within the Support Services Program for this exemption.

(E) Employee benchmarks:

AGO is requesting funding for benchmarks for employees of the AGO. Funding has not been included previously. This would allow AGO to reward staff after advanced training courses or certifications for their area of expertise. It would also help with retention of current AGO employees. It is anticipated that approximately 15 benchmarks would be awarded within the agency.

2 - Training

Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Training Program is charged with the responsibility of providing training for Mississippi Prosecutors. The Program was statutorily created, Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), to provide Continuing Legal Education (CLE) and technical assistance training for Mississippi's state, county, municipal and youth prosecutors. Further, as statutorily dictated in Section 43-21-117, all youth court prosecutors and county prosecuting attorneys who serve as youth court prosecutors shall be required to receive juvenile justice training approved by the Mississippi Attorney General's Office and regular annual continuing education in the field of juvenile justice.

The Program also provides technical assistance for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys as provided by Section 37-26-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972) by training criminal investigators, victim assistance coordinators, and others who provide technical support for District Attorneys, county prosecuting attorneys, and municipal prosecuting attorneys. The Program serves as a liaison for the prosecutors and the Mississippi Legislature, as well as various State, Federal, and local criminal justice agencies and groups.

II. Program Objective:

The primary objective of the Training Program is to enhance criminal justice services to the citizens of the State of Mississippi by providing critical, applicable, and timely continuing legal education for State, county, and municipal prosecuting attorneys.

- IV. Additional program activities that will result from increased funding requested in Columns 16-25 (MBR-1-03) and specified Budget Decision Unit Columns (MBR-1-03-A):
- (D) Funding of Paralegal Series:

The Attorney General's Office is requesting additional funding for 2 existing PINs to be considered paralegals in the Training Program. In reviewing the work of the AGO, there is not enough use of paralegals for law matters. The AGO is the state's largest law firm and having this paralegal series would allow attorneys to spend more time on cases and would allow the AGO to take on more cases that are currently hired for outside counsel costing the state and other agencies millions each year. This funding would be in line with the MSPB SEC2 initiative.

(E) Provide funding for Special Assistant Attorney General start salary:

AGO employs over one hundred attorneys and currently does not have funds to pay the attorneys at the level necessary to recruit and retain staff. Turnover is a big issue with attorneys as other agencies can poach our attorneys and pay more since they only need a few or just one attorney. To create parity, the AGO is requesting funding to be able to hire at the MSPB start salary of Special Assistant Attorney Generals. This would also move those at that pay up the same amount and create parity. There are 4 Special Assistant Attorney Generals in this program that would be included in the requested funding increase.

(F) Upgrade of software for training registration and maintaining of CLE hours:

The software program currently utilized by the Training Program has additional capabilities for electronic registration of trainings and maintaining of Continuing Legal Education (CLE) hours for attorneys. AGO is requesting additional funding of \$11,286 to update this software.

(G) Initial funding for replacement of case management system:

Re-appropriated funding from FY2021 to FY2022 in the amount of \$646,000 will not be requested again in FY2023

3 - Litigation

Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General as stated in Section 7-5-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), "...shall be the chief legal officer and advisor for the state, both civil and criminal, and is charged with managing all litigation on behalf of the state. "

Civil litigation provides trial and appellate legal representation to the State, State agencies and boards, and State officials and employees sued in their official and individual capacities. Civil actions are as varied as discrimination, personal injury, voting rights, contracts, Section 1983 prisoner litigation, civil rights, and administrative appeals in all state and federal courts.

Criminal litigation represents the State in all appeals from our state trial courts, all federal actions involving petitions for writs of habeas corpus, and other related proceedings in state and federal courts. The attorneys practice in our state trial courts, the Mississippi Supreme Court, the Mississippi Court of Appeals, the United States District Courts of Mississippi, the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals, and the Supreme court of the United States. In Mississippi, defendants have a statutory right to appeal their convictions from the circuit court to the Mississippi Supreme court. The Criminal litigation division files a brief on each of these appeals on behalf of the State, with the goal to preserve felony convictions and sentences. Oral arguments are held at the request of the appellate courts. this division is divided into three teams: (1) Direct Appeals team, which handles all non-death penalty appeals from our state trial courts, including direct appeals and post-conviction relief appeals; (2) Death Penalty Litigation team, which handles all litigation following a capital murder conviction and imposition of the death penalty, including trail and appellate level proceedings in state and federal courts; and (3) Federal Habeas Corpus team, which handles all no-death penalty federal habeas corpus cases in federal courts. This division offers advice and assistance to local District Attorney's offices and also reviews extraditions for the Governor's Office.

The Litigation Program does not solicit its cases and has little control regarding the number of cases which staff must handle.

The objective of the Litigation Program is to manage all litigation on behalf of the State in a timely and professional manner and to maintain a docket of such cases.

5 - State Agency Contracts

Program Name

I. Program Description:

In accordance with Section 7-5-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), and case law explaining the constitutional powers of the Attorney General of Mississippi under Section 173 of the Mississippi Constitution, the Office of the Attorney General is responsible for representing the State, its officials, and the state agencies carrying out the powers of the executive branch of government. The primary responsibility for the State Agency Contracts Program is for each attorney assigned to the Program to handle the day-to-day legal representation of state agencies. Attorneys within this division maintain a record of their time spent for an agency within the CRIMES, the current case management system utilized by the Attorney General's Office.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the State Agency Contracts Program is to render such services deemed necessary to assist in advising and in representing the State and its entities and agencies as appropriate. The State Agency Contracts Program ensures an agency that specialization is provided and continuity of services is maintained.

7 - Other Mandated Programs

Program Name

I. Program Description:

The Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs consists of the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, the Public Integrity Division, the Consumer Protection Division, the Alcohol and Tobacco Enforcement Division, and the Bureau of Victim Assistance. These programs are fully comprehensive law enforcement units staffed by criminal investigators, auditors, and prosecuting attorneys who serve in combating the corrupt, deceptive, and illegal practices of unscrupulous medical providers, public officials, drug traffickers, and business enterprises.

The Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, established by Section 43-13-219, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), is responsible for the statewide investigation and prosecution of fraud committed by Medicaid providers. This Unit is also responsible for the investigation of abuse, neglect, and financial exploitation perpetrated upon vulnerable persons who are residents or patients in health care facilities. Funding for this program is received from a federal grant which reimburses 75% of the operating expenses. The Unit is re-certified annually by the Office of the Inspector General, Health and Human Services.

The Public Integrity Division is charged with the responsibility of conducting official investigations in accordance with Section 7-5-59, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), which details white collar crime and official corruption and assisting district attorneys and local law enforcement officials in the performance of their duties; and with the responsibility of impaneling a statewide grand jury to investigate and charge large-scale drug offenders in accordance with Section 13-7-1, et seq., Miss Code Ann. (1972). This Unit receives complaints and allegations from a variety of sources: state and local officials who have discovered such conduct in the performance of their routine responsibilities; calls and letters from citizens throughout the State who have observed actions that are believed to be improper; and referral of cases from local law enforcement officials and prosecutors which could better be handled by this Unit. The Public Integrity Division is comprised of both attorneys and investigators who work closely together to ensure that cases are efficiently prosecuted and also work with the Mississippi Bureau of Narcotics and other state and local law enforcement entities in identifying and dismantling large drug organizations through both criminal prosecution and civil forfeiture actions. The Public Integrity Division serves as the enforcement arm of the Mississippi Charitable Solicitations Act which requires charities to properly register with the Secretary of State's Office. The Vulnerable Persons Investigative Unit and Child Support Prosecution Unit are also a part of the Public Integrity Division. The Vulnerable Persons Unit was created as a part of the Vulnerable Persons Act [Section 43-47-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] to prosecute those accused of crimes against vulnerable persons and provide training to law enforcement, judges, district attorneys, state agencies and investigators at the Department of Human Services. The unit receives complaints from the Department of Human Services and other law enforcement agencies as well as complaints from other concerned individuals. [Section 43-47-5, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] The Child Support Prosecution Unit investigates and criminally prosecutes deadbeat parents for failure to pay court ordered child support in compliance with Sections 43-19-61 and 97-5-3, Miss. Code Ann. (1972).

The Cybercrime Division investigates and prosecutes high technology crimes in compliance with Section 7-5-59, Miss. Code Ann. (1972) to provide a safe electronic environment in Mississippi for the communication of information, ideas and commercial transactions and to protect children from online predators. The Division also provides technical assistance to state, local, and federal law enforcement officials in the investigation of electronic crimes as well as the seizure of computers and other digital evidence. The Division also coordinates with the United States Secret Service to host the Cyber Fraud Task Force for the State. This task force includes state and local partnerships to address technologically facilitated crimes in Mississippi. The Attorney General's Cybercrime Division receives federal funds to establish and operate an Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. The ICAC Task Force is the umbrella agency for the State of Mississippi for enforcement, investigation, and prosecution of Internet Crimes Against Children. The Task Force is the central training facility for ICAC investigative standards, forensic analysis, and prosecution and provides on-site and in-the- field technical assistance for agencies involved in ICAC cases. The Task Force provides leadership for proactive and reactive investigations and extends outreach into law enforcement, the community, and the educational system for prevention and intervention of internet or technological exploitation of children.

The Consumer Protection Division was created in 1974 by Section 75-24-1, et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972), as amended. The Consumer Protection Act of 1994 amended and strengthened this Section. Consumer Protection handles a wide range of complaints from citizens located throughout the State of Mississippi. These complaints include, but are not limited to, lottery and sweepstakes scams, new and used car sales, and telemarketing fraud. Consumer Protection fields thousands of calls and emails each year. The Division is also charged with the investigation and prosecution of identity theft, home repair fraud, and intellectual property crimes, as well as the issuance of Identity Theft Passports [Section 97-45-29, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)]. The Division promotes consumer education through participation in civic group functions, student lectures, law

enforcement seminars, and other types of presentations throughout the State, as well as publishes and distributes public education brochures. Mediation of business complaints and investigation of deceptive business practices constitute a large part of the Division's activities. To carry out its mission, Consumer Protection is also authorized to exercise various types of enforcement activities, including subpoenas, cease and desist orders, assurances of voluntary compliance, injunctions, criminal prosecutions, and collection of civil penalties.

The Bureau of Victim Assistance Interpersonal Domestic Violence Division [Section 93-21-31, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)], provides support and training for law enforcement, judges, court personnel, advocates, social workers, students and medical personnel in the areas of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, strangulation sexual assault, Domestic Abuse Protection Orders, and related matters including human trafficking and victims' rights. The Division works with other divisions within the Attorney General's Office to accomplish training goals. The Division produces educational and training guides to support its efforts and also works in conjunction with other public entities and non-profit organizations for the promotion of domestic violence prevention and victim assistance. The Division also administers the statewide Domestic Abuse Protection Order Registry [Section 93-21-25, Miss. Code Ann. (1972)] and trains court clerks, dispatch, and law enforcement on usage of the Registry as well as the Domestic Violence Uniform Offense Report used by law enforcement to report domestic violence incidents. The Division has a statewide Human Trafficking Victim Services Coordinator who works with other divisions, agencies and non-profits to develop and implement human trafficking legislation and works closely with government partners and private entities developing and implementing a cohesive approach to investigating, prosecuting and ending human trafficking in Mississippi. By serving as a resource to all those who come into contact with domestic violence, strangulation, stalking, sexual assault and human trafficking victims, the Division brings the full weight of the State of Mississippi to combat these crimes to achieve the objectives of holding offenders accountable, keeping victims and law enforcement safe, and referring victims to resources and services.

The Alcohol & Tobacco Enforcement Division ensures compliance with state laws that prohibit the sale of tobacco products and alcohol to minors. The FDA Unit which is also a part of the Alcohol & Tobacco Enforcement Division is funded through the Food and Drug Administration and ensures compliance with federal laws that prohibit the sale of tobacco to minors.

II. Program Objective:

The overall objective of the Attorney General's Other Mandated Programs is to investigate and prosecute all illegal activities relating to Medicaid fraud, elder abuse/neglect/exploitation, drug trafficking, misconduct of public officials and business enterprises, identity theft, cybercrime, child support, and tobacco and alcohol sale to minors. In addition, assistance is provided to United States Attorneys, district attorneys, and federal and local law enforcement agencies in the performance of their duties. Other Mandated Programs addresses juvenile prevention, intervention, and juvenile justice alternatives. The Program is also involved in the war on drugs by utilizing the State's asset forfeiture statutes and providing prosecutors and law enforcement officers with pre-arrest asset investigative assessments and post-arrest legal as well as prosecutorial assistance.

- III. Current program activities as supported by the funding in Columns 6-15 (FY 2022 & FY 2023Increase/Decrease for continuations) of MBR-1-03 and designated Budget Unit Decisions columns of MBR-1-03-A:
- (D) Provide Funding for Investigator Salary Parity:

The investigators series currently utilized by the AGO is too low to recruit and retain top talent for the work needed at the AGO. The AGO is requesting funding to more closely align with the series utilized by the State Auditor's Office. The Auditor's office has been able to recruit several employees from the AGO because they can pay a higher salary. The total cost for full funding to create parity across State government is \$775,000 with salaries and fringe benefits. This would align with the MSPB SEC2 initiative. No new PINS are being requested in this funding. There are 78 investigators in this program that would be included in the requesting funding increase.

(E) Replacement of vehicles meeting DFA's replacement criteria:

The Attorney General's Office is authorized for law enforcement vehicles and has approximately 10 vehicles that should be considered for replacement in FY2023 based on DFA's replacement criteria. The AGO is authorized for law enforcement vehicles, which are driven by our investigators who provide a valuable service to our agency and the State of Mississippi; therefore a reliable vehicle is critical for their daily use.

(F) Replacement and standardization of weapons:

Program Data Collected in Accordance with the Mississippi Performance Budget and Strategic Planning Act of 1994 (To Accompany Form MBR-1-03)

Any sworn law enforcement officer of the Attorney General's Office can be issued a state purchased weapon based on their assigned job responsibilities. The current AGO administration is establishing a standard of weapon equipment based on an investigator's role and responsibilities and is requesting funding to purchase replacement weapons in accordance with the established standardization. The current weapons will be traded in and is reflected in the requested funding. Current weapons are almost all over 10 years old.

(G) Replacement equipment for Cyber Crimes division:

The Cyber Crime division within the Attorney General's Office provides unparalleled investigative and forensic services in our fight against corruption, abuse of the elderly, and human trafficking. Several items of equipment currently being used by this division has exceeded its useful life or capacity and should be replaced. Funding is being requested to replacement a forensic workstation and several computers with specified components.

(H) Replacement of ballistic vests:

Due to the nature of investigations being performed by the Attorney General's Office, each investigator is fitted for and provided a ballistic vest. These vests have a recommend useful life, so this initial funding request will establish a rotation plan for replacement of the ballistic vests after the expiration of the recommended useful life.

(I) Establishment of office space for MS Medicaid Fraud Control Unit:

The MS Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU) currently operates on a designated floor within the Attorney General's Office. Matching funding is being requested for the establishment of adequate office space for the physical separation of MFCU. Location for the MFCU has not been determined at this time. AGO is evaluating location based on spacing needs at a reasonable price.

(J) Continuation of victim advocacy due to decrease in grant funding:

The Attorney General's Office currently receives pass-through funding for the victim advocates that are a vital component of providing direct assistance to victims and their families. It is anticipated that the pass-through funding will be significantly decreased, so General Funds are necessary to be able to fully continue the advocacy program for victims and their families.

(N) Additional employees and equipment for Cyber Crime division:

Due to the advancement and ever-changing technology in today's world, there is a dramatic increase in the investigations and other services being performed by the AGO Cyber Crime division. Efforts to address these increases in work have resulted in significant accumulations of compensation time earned and long working hours for current team members. Based on the nature of these investigations and analyses, it is well documented to be hazardous to investigators, examiners, and prosecutors after working beyond normal working conditions and can significantly impact the investigations and analysis. Funding requested would add one Special Assistant Attorney General, two investigators, two vehicles for the investigators, laptop computers, ballistic vests, weapons, and general operating expenses. Funding requested consists of the following: salary/fringe of \$241,300; commodities of \$20,800, equipment of \$5,300; and two vehicles for \$60,000.

(O) Additional employees and equipment for Human Trafficking investigations:

The Attorney General's Office has partnered with businesses in the State to be a part of the solution in combatting Human Trafficking. Additional employees and equipment are needed to handle investigations in Human Trafficking as well as assist and educate local, federal, and other state law enforcement in Human Trafficking cases. Funding includes one assistant chief, three investigators, four vehicles and weapons, four laptops, and general operating expenses. Funding requested consists of the following: salary/fringe of \$259,080; commodities of \$24,00; equipment of \$7,200; and four vehicles at \$120,000.

(P) Hire contract employee as in-take specialist:

Due to the volume and variation of calls and complaints that are received by the Attorney General's Office, funding is being requested to hire on a contract basis a retired law enforcement officer to review the initial information received and route the call or complaint to the proper level and type of investigation necessary.

(Q) Agency brochures and other printing:

The Attorney General's Office has become proactive ins tackling Mississippi's greatest challenges such as but not limited to: opioid abuse, human trafficking and consumer issues. Agency specific brochures and other printed items would have a significant impact on reaching, educating, and working with Mississippians and communities to be a part of the solutions and advance our State's best interests.

I. Program Description:

The Crime Victims Compensation Division provides financial assistance and support services to victims of violent crime and their family members as mandated in the MS Crime Victims Compensation Act [Section 99-41-1 et seq., Miss. Code Ann. (1972)]. Compensation is awarded for medical care, rehabilitation, counseling services for the victim and the victim's family member(s), funeral expenses, loss of wages, loss of tuition, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, execution travel, domestic violence temporary housing assistance, domestic violence relocation assistance, and repair/replacement. The overall maximum allowable for awards payable is twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), with limits applied to each benefit type. Also, the Crime Victim Compensation Division reimburses medical providers authorized payments for costs of sexual assault medical forensic examinations. Additionally, the Crime Victim Compensation Division provides ongoing training to victim service providers, law enforcement agencies, medical and mental health providers and others across the state who provide information, support and care to victims. The Victim Assistance Program was established with a federal grant in FY 2000 to provide enhanced direct services to crime victims. The program serves as a single point of contact for crime victims and the public-at-large in the State of Mississippi providing information, referral, advocacy and support to persons who contact the program.

The Address Confidentiality Program (ACP), mandated by Section 99-47-1, Miss. Code Ann. (1972), became effective July 1, 2009. Persons enrolled in the ACP may request that state/local government agencies use a substitute address designated by the Attorney General's Office. The ACP can help a relocated victim of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking in their attempt to keep their new address confidential.

II. Program Objective:

The objective of the Crime Victims Compensation Division is to relieve the hardships of crime victims and assist in their recovery whenever possible by providing compensation, direct services, advocacy, and public awareness and education to victims, their family members, law enforcement, court officials, and the public-at-large.

- IV. Additional program activities that will result from increased funding requested in Columns 16-25 (MBR-1-03) and specified Budget Decision Unit Columns (MBR-1-03-A):
- (D) Funding for Paralegal Series:

The Attorney General's Office is requesting additional funding for 1 existing PIN to be considered a paralegal in the Crime Victim Compensation Program. In reviewing the work of the AGO, there is not enough use of paralegals for law matters. The AGO is the state's largest law firm and having this paralegal series would allow attorneys to spend more time on cases and would allow the AGO to take on more cases that are currently hired for outside counsel costing the state and other agencies millions each year. This funding would be in line with the MSPB SEC2 initiative.

(E) Provide funding for Special Assistant Attorney General start salary.:

AGO employs over one hundred attorneys and currently does not have funds to pay the attorneys at the level necessary to recruit and retain staff. Turnover is a big issue with attorneys as other agencies can poach our attorneys and pay more since they only need a few or just one attorney. To create parity, the AGO is requesting funding to be able to hire at the MSPB start salary of Special Assistant Attorney Generals. This would also move those at that pay up the same amount and create parity. There are 2 Special Assistant Attorney Generals in this program that would be included in the requested funding increase.

NARRATIVE 2023 BUDGET REQUEST

Attorney General (070-00)

Name of Agency

The Fiscal Year 2023 Budget Request for the Attorney General's Office includes the appropriation for eight (8) programs -Supportive Services, Training, Opinions, Litigation, State Agency Contracts, Insurance Integrity Enforcement, Other Mandated Programs, and Crime Victims Compensation. These programs represent the combined budget of the State's largest law office. By mandate of Article 6, Section 173, Mississippi Constitution of 1890, there shall be an Office of Attorney General. This office is entrusted with management of all legal affairs of the State and prosecution of all suits, civil or criminal, in which the State has an interest. The Attorney General has the power to control and manage all litigation on behalf of the state and to maintain all suits necessary for enforcement of State laws, preservation of order, and protection of public rights.

The passage of the "Mississippi Budget Transparency and Simplification Act of 2016" during the 2016 Regular Session [SB 2362] and SB 2001 during the 2017 First Extraordinary Session resulted in a material redesign of the funding structure of this office. Accordingly, our FY 2023 Budget Request is a representation of this major funding shift from multiple funding sources in FY 2016 to general and federal funding sources with limited special funds in FY 2023. In an effort to continue the responsibilities and services mandated in statute, the Office of the Attorney General is requesting a total of \$39,102,268 for FY 2023 of which \$31,727,059 is in general funds. Overall funding changes are described in more detail in the paragraphs below and in the program narratives.

The Attorney General's Office has several new requests. All requests are included in the Program Decision Units. One request that is submitted the same as last year is that the AGO is requesting exemption from 25-3-39, which excludes employees from being paid a salary in excess of the executive head, for certain positions. Based on a multi-state salary survey, the salaries of attorneys and key executive employees are grossly underpaid when compared to the four contiguous states as well as the private sector. AGO is coordinating with the National Association of Attorney Generals and other states to perform a review of the relevant labor market. The requested funding would help move closer to what other state's AG offices currently pay as well as compare to other state agencies across the state. Total funding requested for the ability to pay certain employees a salary higher than the Attorney General is \$255,000.00. This will help the agency better recruit and retain specialized attorneys. Exemption from 25-3-39 would give exemption to all AG attorneys. This funding request is only for certain attorneys to make greater than the AG.

Additionally The Attorney General's Office employs over one hundred attorneys and 76 investigators and currently does not have funds to pay the attorneys and investigators at the level necessary to recruit and retain staff. Turnover in these positions is high and continues to grow. Other state agencies and district attorneys are poaching our attorneys and investigators.

In looking for ways to be more efficient, the Attorney General's Office is requesting funding and 10 additional PINS for Paralegals. In reviewing the work of the AGO, there is not enough use of paralegals for law matters. The AGO is the state's largest law firm and having this paralegal series would allow attorneys to spend more time on cases and would allow the AGO to take on more cases that are currently hired for outside counsel costing the state and other agencies millions each year. This funding would be in line with the MSPB SEC2 initiative. The AGO is requesting the full increase in compliance as awarded in salary increase, \$949,000 total. There will be 36 paralegals for the agency and 26 are already in the agency in generic state titles.

The Budget Request by major object for Fiscal Year 2023 is as follows:

Personal Services - Salaries

The Attorney General's Office is requesting \$30,592,311 in salaries, wages and fringe benefits. Salaries comprise 78.2% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The largest portion of these funds ensures that competent attorneys with appropriate expertise represent the State of Mississippi in all actions from litigation to state agency representation. Critical support for these attorneys is provided by the legal secretarial staff. Such support is necessary in assisting the attorneys in meeting deadlines, filing appropriate documents in various courts, and maintaining case files and dockets.

Personal Services - Travel

This Office is requesting \$802,400 in this category. Travel costs comprise 2.05% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. The in-state travel is used to pay for legal staff to represent the Agency in matters relating to pending litigation, to attend court, investigative travel, annual meetings for CLE, conducting investigations of retail establishments that sell tobacco products and alcohol to minors and seminars held outside the Jackson area. The out-of-state travel request is for attending NAAG (National Association of Attorneys General) meetings held for various staff members, training required for Medicaid Fraud and Insurance

Fraud Investigators, presenting arguments before the Fifth Circuit and U.S. Supreme Court, and providing CLE training to prosecutors sponsored by the National District Attorneys Association.

Contractual Services

\$4,505,675 is requested in the Contractual Services Category. Contractual costs comprise 11.5% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

Commodities

We are requesting \$593,500 in this category. Commodity costs comprise 1.52% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office. This is continuation of current needs.

Capital Outlay

2. Equipment

\$387,500 is requested in this area for replacement and purchase of office machines, furniture, fixtures, equipment and IS equipment. Equipment costs comprise 0.99% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

3. Vehicles

\$565,000 is requested for the replacement of ten (10) high mileage undercover law enforcement vehicles plus vehicles for new law enforcement team members. Vehicle costs comprise 1.44% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

Subsidies, Loans & Grants

The \$1,655,881 requested for Subsidies, Loans and Grants comprises 4.23% of the overall budget for the Attorney General's Office.

The Victims Compensation Division will provide financial assistance and services to victims of violent crime and their family members. Compensation is awarded for medical care, counseling services for victims and victims' family members, funeral expenses, loss of wages to the victim or claimant, loss of support for dependents of deceased victims, crime scene clean-up, court related travel, domestic violence temporary assistance and domestic violence relocation assistance.

The Crime Prevention Division will provide support to the Children's Advocacy Centers of Mississippi. These Centers provide training to forensic interviewers in child abuse and child sexual abuse cases, and training for law enforcement officers and prosecutors about child abuse cases. The Crime Prevention Division will also provide support to entities for the implementation of the Annie E. Casey Foundation Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI).

Overall

This budget is funded from general funds, federal grant monies, and other limited special funds. In conclusion, as stated previously, the Attorney General's Office is requesting \$39,102,267 including escalated funds and positions for FY 2023. \$31,727,059 in general funds is being requested. The sums requested are the result of careful planning and reflect those resources essential for the performance of the Attorney General's constitutional mandates. Program requests are interwoven to produce a well-integrated budget. Consequently, the ability of the Attorney General's Office to fully perform its duties requires a balanced, broad-based allocation of resources.

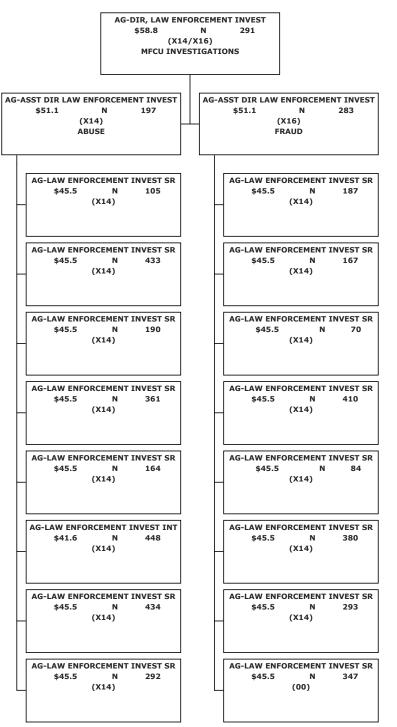


MEDICAID FRAUD CONTROL UNIT
